3. Build common understanding of the local knowledge the action area-specific threats to achieving a healthy Puget Sound within each goal.
4. Begin the discussion regarding criteria that should be used to evaluate actions to include in the 2020 Action Agenda.

Questions for breakout groups:

Indicators for the goal

- For each goal, what are the indicators or attributes that you are measuring and tracking (e.g., dissolved oxygen, habitat acres, shellfish beds available for harvest, number of jobs, etc.)?

Status of the goal

- What is the status of the indicators for this goal? What assessments are available (completed and/or in progress) for these indicators? (e.g., salmon plans, TMDL plans, 2514 work, other local plans and assessments)

Threats to the goal

- What are the known threats to this goal? What assessments are available (completed and/or in progress) for threats to the goal?
- Based on existing documentation, what do you think are the greatest threats to the South Central action area?

Criteria to establish priorities

- What conceptual models that link status to threats exist for this goal and/or geographic area (e.g., many local salmon plans have a hypothesis or model; some areas have other types of conceptual models)?
- What criteria are you using now to establish priority actions?
- What other criteria do you think should be considered?
